Public Safety

Improving public safety is a top priority for me. I supported the Peel Police budget to hire a historic 300 new officers this year. I also conducted a text survey, and here's what residents shared as top issues:

Residential Rental Licensing



The Residential Rental Licensing (RRL) Program cracks down on slum landlords and prioritizes safe housing and quality of life. 3,227 units have been licensed as of February 2025. Escalating fines are now in place for repeat offenders for illegal parking, garbage, overgrown grass, and snow removal. By-law Enforcement is now proactively enforcing through unannounced blitzes.

By-law Enforcement

Effective bylaw enforcement is necessary to successfully address issues related to RRL and illegal rentals. As a result of resident feedback, I championed an operational review of by-law enforcement which resulted in:

- Hiring 40 additional officers
- Proactive enforcement in hot-spots
- Prioritization of property standards
- Escalating fines for repeat offenders
- Community standards blitzes
- Improved standard operating procedures

Community Services

We are increasing investments in community services:

- Safety investments to prevent encampments
- Hiring 24 additional firefighters
- Increasing recreation programs by 5%
- Free recreation access for Seniors 65+ years old

Cleaning Up Neighbourhoods

Properties with overflowing and improperly stored garbage will now face escalated fines starting at \$250 for a first offence, \$500 for a second offence, and \$750 for any subsequent offences.
